Update on Stop the Bleed Program

Most MSMA Alliance members have heard about the Stop the Bleed program from various meetings and articles in the past couple of years, but not all were able to attend the hands-on course presented during the 2019 Fall Conference in

Hannibal.

The program was developed by the American College of Surgeons which saw the need to train members of the general public on how to stop bleeding after a road traffic accident

or a shooting to avoid unnecessary loss of life. The course and demonstration include the correct methods of applying compression to a bleeding wound, packing the wound with clean cloth or hemostatic gauze, and the use of tourniquets.

MSMA Alliance obtained a grant from AHEI toward the cost of purchasing the expensive demonstration kits so that we could reach out into the community to provide public awareness of the program and either offer these courses ourselves or become facilitators putting interested groups in touch with existing approved courses. It was our intention to train eligible instructors among the Alliance members (mostly RNs) and approach school or church

groups to set this program in motion – and then Covid got in the way of our plans.

The course to become certified is given to a group of

individuals by qualified instructors in much the same way that CPR courses are given. However, during the pandemic, all the training programs were closed so there has been a delay in getting any members qualified as instructors to certify others. In addition, all the target groups,

such as the schools, were unable to accept any outsiders coming onto their premises and being in close contact with students and staff. Now that some of the Covid restrictions are being lifted, the plans for the program will resume. Courses are opening up to train the instructors, Alliance members around the state will have opportunities to become certified, and schools and church groups will become more receptive to participating in these programs. Health VP Angela Zylka is excited about the program and introducing it to our members as she plans future travels around the state. We will be presenting this program at the North Central States Meeting in St. Louis.

The day adjourned and was followed by the Missouri Celebration for Sue Ann. A video was shared by Jana Wolfe with thanks from various Missouri legislators, physicians, friends, and family who acknowledged Sue Ann's hard work as AMA Alliance President. She was presented with a box of congratulation cards from members, a gift card to her favorite restaurant, and a bouquet of flowers as well as an engraved champagne bottle and engraved champagne glasses.

She also defined some basics in mindfulness such as the five pillars of reflection to include Awareness, Values, Motivation, Management, and Leadership. Keeping all these in mind can release stress and a reminder of the power of the moment.

Meetings reconvened the next day to include amendments to the Bylaws to be completed at a later date. Dave Street led the benediction and called for a moment of silence for all the healthcare workers who lost their lives to COVID in the past year.

Susan Baily, MD, AMA President, provided the keynote address and highlighted the current AMA platform on health, updates, and issues that concern physician burn-out, EMR, and inclusion.
